
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Who is Irene Vasco?





I grew up reading and writing. During my childhood and adolescence, I spent time with my mother, Sylvia Moscovitz, a Brazilian artist who created children's programs for Colombia's newly established National Television. My mother asked me to write stories, song lyrics, and adaptations of traditional tales. I also recorded character voices for the National Radio, bringing to life the stories we created together. The program featured artists such as Fanny Buitrago, Manuel Zapata Olivella, Beatriz Caballero (writers). laime Manzur (puppets), Teresa Tejada (scenography), Hilda Pace (choreography), Ignacio de Narváez (composition), Clarita Correa and Amparo Ángel (pianists), Esteban Cabezas, Leonor González Mina, and Francisco Zumagué (musicians). I learned from them how to create for children.

Since the programs were broadcast live, only a few photographic records remain.

Professionally, since 1984, I have dedicated myself to writing for children and young adults. Additionally, I have led and supported reading and writing formation programs throughout Colombia, visiting libraries, communities, and schools as an author and reading promoter.

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Children's literature tells life like any other literature; sometimes the conflicts are less painful or can be addressed with a lot of humor, but without conflict, there is no story. We have all encountered violence; it is part of our nature.















Writing for Children and Young Adults











My literary production includes both documentary and fiction books for children and young adults. Some are published by various publishing houses in Latin America, while others are included in anthologies or magazines.

So many travels, experiences, stories heard, and an irresistible urge to tell them! Who could keep these adventures to themselves? I certainly cannot. They become an obsession. Fortunately, I am meticulous and carefully preserve my travel notebooks. My memory is fragile, so I want to have everything documented. When writing a story, a novel, an article, or a lecture about my work as a promoter, I rely on photos, videos, notes, addresses, and maps—my travel logs, the footprints of my journeys.



My books explore different themes. Some are about librarians, teachers, and readers, with stories collected from workshops I conduct in various communities. Others depict the everyday lives of young children, while a few feature animal protagonists. Several books reflect Colombia's history, geography, and culture.

The "Expedition" collection consists of reading guides designed to introduce children to great works and authors of world literature. Below, you will find a catalog of these publications, as well as books that have been translated into other languages, books written in collaboration about Public and School Libraries, health program booklets, books I have translated from Portuguese (my second language), articles on Colombian artists, and various "fragments" published in different places.












Sin pies ni cabeza

After many misadventures, the unexpected ending leaves her with more aches and pains than ever—all because she was a poor student and couldn't remember her magic lessons.




Medalla de honor

What Simón doesn't know is that his grand love will come to an abrupt end with a single unexpected encounter at the beauty salon with his mother. A surprising revelation awaits him!









Relying on the reconciliatory power of words, the PALABRAS QUE ACOMPAÑAN campaign was launched in 2002 as a social contribution program by the DOLEX-PANADOL brand from the GlaxoSmithKline laboratory. The program included two parallel aspects:

- Reading in hospitals.
- A collection of materials aimed at medical staff, parents, and hospitalized children

For the creation of this collection, together with María del Sol Peralta, we visited hospitals, met with pediatricians, interviewed parents and children, and developed a series of seven booklets beautifully illustrated by Esperanza Vallejo and designed by Ana Milena Piedrahíta.
