Rasmus Bregnhøi

Rasmus Bregnhøi was born in 1965 in Langerød and graduated from the Danish Design School in 1992.

He made his debut as an illustrator in 1987 with the picture book *Arne Doesn't Like Horses* (which was written by his brother) and has since become one of Denmark's most popular illustrators.

Rasmus Bregnhøi has illustrated picture books, easy readers, comics, graphic novels, and everything in between. He has also written several children's books himself.

In recent years, the Mira series, which Bregnhøi creates in collaboration with his partner Sabine Lemire, has gained immense popularity. The series has been sold for publication in multiple countries and has also been adapted for both stage and screen.

He has received numerous literary awards and has been nominated for even more for his books for children and young adults.

Statement

"His illustrations do more than accompany the text – they enhance and expand its meaning with warmth and depth."

For over three decades, Rasmus Bregnhøi has been one of Denmark's most prominent and celebrated illustrators. His work is defined by a rare blend of warmth, humor, and whimsy that captivates both children and adults. While he is best known as a picture book illustrator, his contributions to Danish children's and young adult literature also span graphic novels, comics, short stories, and more.

He has collaborated with some of Denmark's most esteemed authors, creating books that have become modern classics in children's literature. In fact, it's hard to find a child's bedroom in Denmark without a book featuring his illustrations.

Bregnhøi is not only a remarkable artist but also a master craftsman. He draws everything by hand—a feat made even more impressive by his prolific output. His dedication to this method reflects his deep respect for both his craft and his readers. His signature style carries a distinct sense of emotion and storytelling energy, bringing his characters and worlds to life.

Whether illustrating his own stories or those of others, Bregnhøi always adds an extra dimension to the narrative. His illustrations do more than accompany the text—they enhance and expand its meaning with warmth and depth. He has a rare talent for balancing humor and seriousness, creating images that resonate with both children and adults.

He is particularly known for his lively illustrations in the *Ib the Dog* series, his collaboration with Sabine Lemire on the *Mira* series, and his long-standing partnership with Kim Fupz Aakeson, which has resulted in the *Mogens and Mahdi* comics and a wide range of beloved picture books.

Bregnhøi's illustrations are marked by a keen eye for detail and a dynamic, expressive energy. His depictions of cities and landscapes are both precise and imaginative. He seamlessly moves between naïve and photorealistic styles—his butterflies, for instance, resemble vintage biology posters, capturing nature's intricacies with scientific accuracy and artistic flair.

His humor is subtle yet layered. At first glance, his drawings may seem simple, but a closer look reveals a wealth of hidden details that invite exploration. His work demonstrates a deep understanding of emotions and character, giving his illustrations a rare sensitivity.

It's hard—if not impossible—to imagine Danish children's literature without Rasmus Bregnhøi. That is why he is Denmark's nominee for the Hans Christian Andersen Award.

Fear Lurks in Every Happy Home

Interview. Rasmus Bregnhøi, a talented illustrator with over 100 books to his name is reflecting on his past, he feels freer and less conservative now than he did 20 years ago, when he struggled to live up to the conventional ideal of a nuclear family.

en minutes earlier than agreed, we meet at the exhibition building Den Frie in Østerbro, Copenhagen. Just a moment ago, the sun was shining. Now, large summer raindrops land on Rasmus Bregnhøi's jacket.

Impatient to get inside, we stand on the steps in front of the main entrance, waiting for the exhibition to open in a few moments.

"Did you make use of what we talked about the other day? And what do you think the interview will be about?" Rasmus Bregnhøi asks, scratching his scalp slightly with one hand without thinking about it.

"About you. And quite a bit about farewells. There's a lot of farewell in the songs you wrote for the album," I reply, referring to Comfortably Uncomfortable, the debut album of the band Bidt.

Rasmus Bregnhøi is known as a playful, humorous, noisy, and storytelling illustrator of more than 100 children's books. Most families with children own a book featuring his drawings or have come across one at the library. He has collaborated with authors such as Kim Fupz Aakeson and is always on the children's side in his illustrations. When he is ironic, it is at the expense of the adults.

At 54, he has now also made his debut as a singer, songwriter, and guitarist in the rock band Bidt, revealing a completely different side of himself. In songs like Ingenting, Angsten lurer, and Sander til, the echoes of a marriage and a divorce can be heard. But there have been several other farewells in Rasmus Bregnhøi's life—such as saying goodbye to his father and also to the man his mother lived with for many years.

As we stand in front of Den Frie, he immediately brings up the topic by singing a verse from an old song once performed by Grethe Ingmann:

"Life is full of farewells / farewells that are not goodbyes / just something that happens, it feels like seconds / a day that vanishes without a trace / then you bid farewell to your youth."

His voice is clear, melodic, and melancholic.

"That's one of my favorite songs," he says.

Then, the doors open to Den Frie's exhibition Drawing Attention.

When we first met a few days earlier, Rasmus Bregnhøi was also early. I could tell as he let me into an office at the shared studio Spild af Tid on Struenseegade in Nørrebro. Not just because the coffee was already prepared on the table in the middle of the room, next to a book-

shelf holding some of the many award-winning books he has worked on. Among them were *The Bone-Burying Machine*, a Knitted Hat — and Duck, which he both wrote and illustrated, as well as some of the Betty books, written by Alberte Winding, and the Mira books, authored by his girlfriend, Sabine Lemire.

But also because he had managed to sketch on the notepad that lay on the table beside the chair he sat in.

In fact, the drawing could well resemble the beginnings of a self-portrait: a slim man with short hair, high temples, distinctive glasses, and open, observant, reflective eyes. A man who seems to ask, "What's the point?"—a repeated line in the first song on the new album.

"I like trying to push myself to do things I didn't think I could. Making the album is really about moving to a place where you're not sure if you'll land safely. I've always enjoyed that. Because it's so vulnerable when you're out there and don't really know if you're going to break your neck," Rasmus Bregnhøi said at the start of our conversation when we talked about what led him and the other middle-aged men in Bidt to debut at such an unusually old age.

He added that he had always felt the same way about drawing:

"But recently, I was talking to one of my friends about how maybe you've reached an age where you need to stand in one spot and dig deeper. Instead of constantly saying, 'Now I'm going in a different direction.' When you're no longer 20, I think you need to demand higher quality in what you create. And maybe you should place yourself where your interests are and start digging deeper."

What would you like to dig deeper into?

"It's actually mostly a feeling, and to a lesser degree, like I am now only going to focus on this or that. I've been and still am very erratic. When I started making picture books, I changed a lot. Every time I made a new book, I thought, 'Now I'm going to do something completely different.' Now I can feel that it's narrowing a bit, and that's really nice. Because I know myself better. It's actually very much about getting to know yourself and accepting who you are."

Moved Out as Soon as Possible

Rasmus Bregnhøi started playing guitar at the age of 13, while living near Næstved.

His mother had moved in with a man who wasn't the

father of her three children. Rasmus's parents divorced when he was 4, his brother was 9, and his sister was 11. His older siblings remember growing up in a traditional family, but Rasmus doesn't.

"Maybe that's why I've always felt more rootless."

A few years after the divorce, Rasmus's mother moved in with a new partner.

"I lived with him from the age of 8 until I moved out at 17. At some point, I started playing guitar. We lived near Næstved, and from the age of 13, I played guitar a lot. When my mom's partner saw me playing, he'd sarcastically say, 'What's up, Donovan?' He was always a bit sarcastic, ironic, and mocking, which is really tough when you're a kid."

It was this man who made Rasmus want to leave home as soon as he could:

"I decided I would never call him 'stepfather.' He's passed away now, but for years, I always referred to him as my mom's partner."

When Rasmus became a father for the first time at 31, he realized that his mom's partner had influenced him, even though he wasn't his biological father. One of those influences was sarcasm:

"I had to consciously break away from it. I thought I wasn't affected by him because he wasn't my dad, and I had my real father. But my mom's partner had passed on some bad habits to me. They're gone now, but I really felt it when my kids were young."

Saying Goodbye to His Father

After Rasmus Bregnhøi's parents divorced, the children mostly lived with their mother, a nurse who is now retired. However, they also spent some time with their father, the illustrator Palle Bregnhøi.

Although Rasmus, like his father, loved to draw, their relationship was complicated. Perhaps that was partly because of their shared passion for illustration.

"We never drew the same way, and we often disagreed on what illustration should be. I think he eventually came to appreciate my drawings, but I'm not entirely sure. For a while, I stopped showing them to him."

Did he ever criticize your drawings?

"No, but he would say things like, 'What you're doing is so grotesque.' It was probably meant as a compliment, but he never actually said he thought I was good at drawing. Funny enough, he always said that he'd never been praised by his own father."

When Palle Bregnhøi passed away in 2016, his children



discovered a collection of his shirts—mostly blue and white striped ones. At the funeral, all the family members, including sons-in-law and grandchildren, wore one of his shirts. Since his father's death, Rasmus has found it easier to connect with him:

"It's strange how that works, but now it's almost comforting to think of him because, in a way, I can create the image of him I want to have. Since he's no longer here, all his positive qualities have had room to blossom. He's not around to block them, and you suddenly realize how much he gave you."

Rasmus has shared these thoughts with his brother: "We talked about how our father really gave us the ability to see—to truly notice the moon, or a field full of dandelions, and many other things. He inspired us in so many ways. But when he was alive, I was often irritated with him."

The Working-Class Dream

Some people slow down and lower their voices when the conversation turns to uncomfortable childhood memories or personal topics.

Rasmus Bregnhøi, however, maintains a relatively fast pace when he speaks, often ending his sentences with a small, disarming laugh, as if to avoid making what he says seem too serious. That laugh is similar to his drawings: neither his words nor his art are in any way pretentious.

In contrast, some of the works in the 'Drawing Attention' exhibition at Den Frie do come across as somewhat self-important—not because we examine them closely (though we would have liked to take a closer look, especially since the exhibition's presentation of contemporary illustrators is relevant to Rasmus), but because we're too absorbed in continuing the interview. First, by discussing the idea of Rasmus illustrating the article with a series of drawings that could form an existential self-portrait.

Then, by revisiting what happened when he left home at 17.

At that time, he trained as a lithographer, even though he knew he wanted to be an illustrator. He could have gone to high school instead, but a "working-class hero dream" and his recurring tendency to want to go against the grain led him to decide that he should become a craftsman.

So, he apprenticed in Copenhagen for three and a half

years, working alongside men much older than himself, while developing a sense of envy for his peers who had the opportunity to get an education in high school.

"I've stopped being upset about it. But for many years, I felt really humiliated by it, and I made sure to read *The Odyssey*' and *The Iliad* so I wouldn't feel intellectually inferior."

Enough of Everything

After completing his lithography training, Rasmus Bregnhøi went on to study at the Danish Design School in Copenhagen. He graduated in 1992 at the age of 27. That same year, he met the woman who would later become his ex-wife in 2010. Five years later, they had their first child, Holger, followed by their second, Hugo. Now, Holger has moved out, and Hugo, who is in his first year of high school, splits his time between his mother and father.

"Time passed / I think we had / Enough of Everything," Rasmus Bregnhøi sings on Bidt's album. Those lines resurfaced in my mind as we left Den Frie and sat down for coffee at a café in Kongens Have, where he began talking about his marriage and divorce.

"There can be many goodbyes and new beginnings in life. When you have children, you end up having to face unresolved issues with your own parents, even if you thought you had already made peace with the past. You thought all that was behind you. But then you have

kids of your own, and as you learn to love them, you find yourself thinking: Wow, you guys were ridiculous."

Rasmus Bregnhøi didn't know exactly how to be a good father or create a traditional family when he had children, but he was determined to try:

"I really wanted to be a proper family man. I was so focused on it. We bought a house, a car, and I just wanted so much to create a good family. Maybe because I never really had that myself."

When their first child was born, Rasmus Bregnhøi naturally, without giving it much thought, assumed the role of provider. Not because his then-wife expected it or lacked an education.

"I just instinctively felt that this family was something I needed to take care of and protect. It wasn't something my ex-wife asked of me, and it wasn't something I grew up with. I didn't have male role models, but I did grow up with Trille's songs. Still, I felt that way. It turned into a classic nuclear family, and I've noticed the same pattern in many others from my generation. I think things are a bit different for younger generations. In my generation, there have always been plenty of excuses for why things ended up that way."

As he talks about his otherwise ordinary marriage, I can almost picture how he would draw it: with tenderness and doubt in the adults' eyes, the endless love for the two boys, the bittersweet trips to Bella Center and Casa Shop to browse new garden tiles and sofas, and the steady shift in conversation topics at dinner parties.

From discussions about toddlers to thoughts of kitchen renovations, and finally, the possibility of buying a summer house.

"In a way, I was much more grown-up or conservative during those years than I am now. And honestly, talking about new kitchens is the most boring thing in the world. I hate hearing anyone talk about renovations."

"Fear lurks in all happy homes," he sings at one point on the album. At some point, he realized that being the perfect family man wasn't possible and that there was more fear in staying than in leaving. But this realization didn't come overnight.

"My ex-wife and I didn't argue—almost never, in fact. I think of it more as a conversation that just stopped. When we met, we talked endlessly, and we did so for years. Then, one day, I realized: we've stopped talking. When I met my girlfriend, Sabine, a new conversation began, and fortunately, it's still going."

When you get divorced, you lose the person who shared

the experience of raising your children from when they were small

"Yes. And I also found it strange that my ex-wife and I had been together almost every day for 18 years, and then suddenly we weren't together anymore."

Soda Water Mondays

Neither earlier nor a couple of hours ago did Rasmus Bregnhøi have his phone out during the interview. Now it rests beside him on the café table, and I can tell he occasionally glances at it. His oldest son, Holger, is taking a written math exam, and Rasmus is waiting for him to call.

Even though Holger has moved out, Rasmus speaks with him nearly every day. Since his divorce in 2010, he's never gotten involved in how things are at the boys' mother's home. However, some things have changed at his own place in the apartment on Christianshavn, which he moved into after the divorce.

Now, he and Hugo are allowed to watch Japanese cartoons while eating dinner, whereas before, he himself had enforced a strict no-screens rule at the dinner table. He also doesn't keep his apartment as pristine as he once did.

Some of these rules have faded with age. Others disappeared with the divorce and the move.

Getting divorced was painful. For a long time, Rasmus felt a "terrible sense of guilt," but at the same time, he was relieved.

"You get the veil lifted from your eyes, and suddenly there's more space, more freedom. At parties, it's often the divorced people who end up in a group, having a great time. The others go home early because they have to go to the summer house the next day. But—and this is a bit childish—Sabine gave me the idea of 'Soda Water Mondays' when I have the kids. Why didn't we do that when I was married? Why did everything have to be so rigid?"

Rasmus Bregnhøi and Sabine Lemire don't live together. They couldn't afford an apartment big enough for both of them and their combined six children. Additionally, neither his two boys nor her four children should be forced to accept a new adult figure in their lives.

"I've already tried the nuclear family. I don't need to try again. I don't want to make the same mistake again. I want to do something different now. Someday, I'd love to live with Sabine, but not right now."

Rasmus Bregnhøi's phone lights up. It's Holger calling.

He's finished his exam and wants to meet his dad soon.

"My place might look a little student-like. There are a lot of books and old furniture. That can annoy me sometimes. Just like I occasionally fear becoming too self-satisfied, I also worry about staying in that student-like state forever. But on the other hand, some friends and I have decided that from now on, we can enjoy the things we love. Even music. If you love a Medina song because it moves you, that's fine. It doesn't have to be all Neil Young."

It wasn't like that when Rasmus Bregnhøi was younger. Back then, there were many rules about what music you could like, how your home should look, and what you could and couldn't do.

What would you like to do with your freedom going forward?

"Sabine and I are working on the Mira series, which I'm really enjoying. And I've started turning the love triangle from my picture book The Bone-Burying Machine, a Knitted Hat – and Duck into an animated film. That's one of the boxes I still need to check: creating a kind of Cirkeline-style animation for young kids. I also want to become really skilled at drawing, technically."

Then there are the hours spent in the rehearsal room and on stage with Bidt. Rasmus Bregnhøi, Per Dybdal Jensen, Jesper Garmer Sand Christensen, and Bidt's other illustrator, Morten Voigt, have been playing together for many years. Initially, they just planned to release Tilpas Utilpas themselves, for their own enjoyment, without involving a record label.

But their friends at the Crunchy Frog label thought the songs were too good to be kept hidden. So now, the album is available both digitally and on a luxury LP with an art booklet.

One of the perks of debuting later in life is that Rasmus Bregnhøi is "completely indifferent to what others think of what we've made."

"It's such a wonderful feeling. I used to be more vain and thought the music had to be groundbreaking to be special. Now, I don't care if it sounds old-fashioned or like C.V. Jørgensen or Niels Skousen. Ten years ago, I would have felt differently."

Little Miss Nobody Little Miss Nobody

A dark, gothic adventure through the underworld of the city.

Seventeen-year-old Lilith, a blind "savior girl," survives a traffic accident where her guide dog is killed. Left without her companion, she's approached by a street kid, Schniff, who's run away from a boys' home and lives on the streets. Known for his affinity for lighter fluid and shellac, Schniff offers to be Lilith's guide. He becomes her eyes by night, guiding her through the city's underworld as the lost souls wake to life.

The story blends gothic horror with social realism, depicting the harsh reality of life in the urban underworld. Told from Schniff's perspective, the tale follows his and Lilith's journey as they become entwined in a mystery after they discover the

body of a young girl while burying Lilith's dead dog. Lilith, with her psychic abilities, instantly recognizes the identity of the dead girl, and the pair sets out to solve the case. Along the way, they encounter a range of sinister and shady characters, including a nod to Charles Dickens with appearances from Oliver Twist and the scheming fence, Fagin.

The illustrations are expressive and gripping, evoking the feel of underground comics with influences from artists like Varenne and Tardi. The book's eerie, mysterious atmosphere is further enhanced by the unique blue coloring, creating an unsettling mood throughout the story. Lille Miss Nobody is a fascinating and exciting innovation in Danish comic book art, combining elements of horror, mystery, and gritty realism.









Big Brother and Little Brother set off into the world. They follow the river out of the city, across a green meadow, into a dark and eerie forest, and out onto the open sea. Along the way, they discover a strange land inhabited by large, yellow ducks. Is it dangerous out there? What lies ahead in this vast world? Rasmus Bregnhøi's author debut is a whimsical picture book about being a small child in a big, unfamiliar world, where adventure and wonder are found at every turn.

The story takes the reader on a journey into the unknown, full of surreal adventures. The nameless little brother follows his big brother through strange landscapes that both fascinate and challenge them. From a colorful town to a mysterious forest, and finally to a land populated by quirky creatures, each page offers a new visual delight.

Visually, My Big Brother and I Go Out is a breath of fresh air, with playful references and details, like cyclopes in the streets and peculiar plants in the underbrush. Each spread features a full-page illustration on the right, while the left page remains simple and blank, with just a little text and decoration—creating a striking contrast that adds to the book's dreamlike and mysterious atmosphere.



He finds himself in a flamboyant world, a strange and lively chaos with flying crocodiles, dwarves, submarine captains, giraffes, penguins, and much more. He keeps catching a glimps of the Wellie Sisters, but he must search high and low, passing through a forest, over and under water, until he finally catches up with them and the three of them return home together.

Along the way, she needs more materials from the junk dealer before finally managing to get up. The junk dealer hints that he'd like to join the tea party,

but Mouse is so focused on her project that she doesn't notice, so the junk dealer ends up inviting himself. It's a funny tale about how logic sometimes fails.

Mouse finally reaches Bird halfway through the book, but after returning the borrowed ladder, she has to come up with a new plan.







I Love You Danmark

I Love You, Denmark

Kim Fupz Aakeson and Rasmus Bregnhøi are the voices behind the 15-year-old refugee boy's secret diary, where stories and impressions from life in a refugee center for children are presented alongside black-and-white illustrations. But both in text and illustration, Aakeson and Bregnhøi capture the mentally bruised, insecure, and confused teenage boy, who is left to the care of random adults and his peers in a refugee center.

The two artists have managed to do this in an absolutely convincing way, so the book feels completely authentic as the boy's own diary.

The book tells, through both text and illustrations, about his longing for the family and friends he

left behind when he fled his country. It tells of the exhausting and insanely expensive journey across half the world, ultimately ending in Denmark at a refugee center designed for children who have arrived without adult companions. And perhaps most of all, it tells of the uncertainty he feels. Will he be allowed to stay, or will he be sent back? What happens if he is denied residency based on some obscure regulation?

One of the things that perhaps makes the book particularly powerful is that it can't only be understood intellectually. As a reader, you are compelled to engage with *I Love You Danmark* emotionally – with empathy and sympathy.

The Story of Ib Madsen follows an apparently ordinary boy—kind, sensible, and organized. He might not be the most handsome, but he's certainly not ugly either. The world sees him as a sweet, happy boy with no trouble at all. But when Ib Madsen goes on a school trip to Møns Klint, he suddenly disappears without a trace, and everyone believes he's dead.

However, the perceptive reader will quickly notice through the illustrations that Ib has secretly planned his escape in a red rubber boat. Many years later, he resurfaces as Mads Ibsen, a bullying expert on DR.

The story is two-fold: while the text portrays a boy who seems to be thriving, the illustrations tell a completely different story. This picture book deeply resonates with both children and adults, prompting reflection on how Ib, the boy no one notices, takes matters into his own hands and runs away from it all. Perhaps he wasn't as content with his life as it appeared. A beautiful, thought-provoking tale that captures the heart.





What stands out in the books about Ib is the focus on the characters' performance. The characters



In the graphic novel series Mira, written by Sabine Lemire—whom Bregnhøi is in a relationship with—he brings the girl Mira to life. The first book was published in 2017. Over the course of more than nine books, we follow Mira and her mother as they navigate the transformation from childhood to adolescence.

While Mira's best friend constantly talks about crushes and relationships, Mira isn't quite done playing yet. Her mother has many different boyfriends. They're nice enough, but it's confusing to always have to relate to a new "dad."

With a mix of comic panels, speech bubbles, diary entries, and wordless full-page illustrations, Bregnhøi creates a relatable, humorous, and warm portrayal of everyday life during that difficult time when one is neither a child nor an adult.

So far, the $Mir\alpha$ series has been sold to 13 countries and has been adapted to both stage and screen.
